EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE/UPDATE/STAFF REPORT

Regional Job Fair/Outreach even in Downey – October 20, 2023 from 10:00 – 2:00

- To be held at Apollo Park

Activities in AJCC:

- The 2022-23 year ended with 6,885 total visits to our system and 3,880 distinct visits.
- In 2023-24, SELACO hopes to double the numbers with “Boots on Ground Initiative:
 - o Hawaiian Gardens – 2 times a week
 - o Paramount Adult School – 1 time a month
 - o Downey Adult School – 2 times per month
 - o Whole Child – 1 day a week
 - o Norwalk/La Mirada – 1 time per month
 - o Artesia Community Center – for special events, at least 34 times a month
 - o Cerritos Adult School – once a month virtually
 - o Bellflower CTE Program – once a month starting in August

2. Request for Approval to Accept Foster Together Network Grant

A motion was made by Joseph Derthick to upon notification of funding, authorize the Executive Director to accept funding and begin implementation of the project described, seconded by Tracey Polley. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

3. Home to Employment Program (H2E)

A motion was made by Connie Chan to:

1. Authorize Executive Director to accept funding for Phase III of Gateway Cities of Government Home to Employment program in the anticipated amount of \$185,706.06.
2. If needed, authorize the Executive Director to procure and contract with service providers who can ensure the project objectives are met successfully.

Seconded by Joseph Derthick. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

4. Approval of SELACO WDB Budget for Program Year 2023-24

A motion was made by Joseph Derthick to:

- Approve proposed budget for Program Year 2023-24 as submitted.
- Authorize Executive Director to submit a request to the State to transfer 60% of Dislocated Workers funding to Adult Services. This represents a total transfer of \$728,420 in funding.
- Approve a staff COLA increase of 2.5% effective with payroll period 17, pay period beginning July 31, 2023.

Seconded by Connie Chan. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

5. Request for Proposal Release: In-School Youth Services PY 2024-2026

A motion was made by Tracey Polley to approve and authorize the Executive Director to release the Request for Proposals (RFP) to procure an In-School Youth Services provider with the following guidelines:

- Secure a special committee to support the RFP evaluation process.
- Budget up to 4400,000 from the SELACO WDB budget to secure the functions of an In-School Youth Services provider for a 24-month period.

Seconded by Aaron Drake. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

6. Request for Approval to accept HOME Grant Allocation

A motion was made by Connie Chan seeking approval to accept Los Angeles County HOME grant allocation of \$55,500 for Program Year 2023-24, seconded by Mark Dameron. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

7. LARPU Prison to Employment 2.0 Approval to Receive Funding

A motion was made by Tracey Polley to:

- Authorize the Executive Director to accept funding from the South Bay WIB under the LARPU Prison to Employment 2.0 award, in the amount of \$235,382 to serve 26 justice involved participants.
- Approve and authorize the Executive Director to allocate funding and issue contracts if applicable and accordingly, based on the program proposal and design to meet the objectives of the P2E 2.0 funding allocation.

With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

8. Request for Approval to Accept HIRE Grant Funds

A motion was made by Aaron Drake, anticipating HIRE funding, authorize the Executive Director to accept funding and serve as a spoke in the regional structure established by LA CADA, the lead organization, seconded by Connie Chan. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

9. Request for Proposal – Single Audit

A motion was made by Aaron Drake to approve and authorize the Executive Director to release the RFP per SELACO WDB policy to contract a qualified independent auditing firm, seconded by Tracy Polley. With no further discussion, motion carries to approve.

RE: Amendment to SELACO WDB 403(b) Retirement Plan

Effective January 1, 2024, as a result of SECURE 2.0 enacted by Congress, age-based catch-up contributions for participants whose compensation in the prior year was greater than \$145,000 (subject to periodic cost of living adjustments in \$5,000 intervals). While we do not have anyone who meets this threshold, age-based catch-up contributions can still be made as pre-tax contributions for catch-up eligible participants with prior year wages under the above mentioned **must also be offered** the ability to designate their age-based catch-up as ROTH contributions.

Currently, our plan does not allow ROTH (after tax) contributions. A ROTH source at this time needs to be added to our plan which will: 1) allow participants to designate any portion of their deferral contributions a ROTH 2) allow participants to designate any portion of their catch-up contributions as ROTH, if their compensation was \$145,000 or less in the prior tax year 3) require that 100% of participant catch-up contributions be designated as ROTH if their compensation was over \$145,000 in the prior tax year; 4) if elected by a plan, permit rollovers or ROTH amounts from other plans into the plan.

Staff seeks approval from the Board to amend the Southeast Los Angeles County Workforce Development Board's (SELACO WDB) plan to allow ROTH contributions effective October 1, 2023. Associated cost includes a one-time amendment cost of \$300.

Action Required:

Authorize Executive Director to sign the amendment to the SELACO WDB retirement plan to allow ROTH contributions effective October 1, 2023.

Authorize the SELACO WDB Board Chair to sign the consent supporting the action taken by the board.

Background- Employment Training Panel- ETP

The Southeast Los Angeles County Workforce Development Board (SELACO WDB) is a prime contractor for the State's Employment Training Panel (ETP) enterprise, a performance-based initiative supporting job creation and retention, through customized skills training. ETP is funded by a special California corporate tax and differs from other workforce development programs whose emphasis is on pre-employment training. SELACO WDB, with ETP funds, fulfills its mission by reimbursing the cost of employer-driven training for incumbent workers. Overall, the ETP program helps to ensure that California businesses will have the skilled workers they need to remain competitive, especially against out-of-state competition. Employers must be able to effectively train workers in response to changing business and industry needs. While the need for workforce training is critical, businesses generally reserve capacity building dollars for highly technical and professional occupations – limiting investment in training for frontline workers who produce goods and deliver services. ETP helps to fill this gap by funding training that is targeted to the frontline workers.

SELACO WDB's ETP initiative differs from SELACO WDB's other projects in that it is a performance-based contract. Three initial benchmarks must be met to secure full payment from the State. These include:

- Classroom start-up – trainees are officially enrolled and start their training.
- Successful completion of the full training schedule.
- 90 days Retention – Trainees stay employed with the training company for 90-days after completion of their last training class, and trainees are earning the California ETP Retention wage of \$22.66 per hour.

SELACO WDB has been a performing ETP contractor with the State Panel since 1995. We are entering our 28th year of being a performing ETP provider. We are finishing our

2022-2024 ETP contract earlier than planned, so this provided an opportunity for SELACO WDB to apply for a new round of ETP funding.

New Agreement: The State ETP Panel heard our Application for 2023-2025 funding, with Yolanda Castro and Kay Ford, in attendance to “defend” our Application. Our application was placed on the “Consent Calendar” due to our consistent excellent performance. SELACO WDB’s Application was not pulled from the Consent calendar during the meeting, thankfully, and the new funding was awarded to SELACO WDB in the amount of \$749,808.

SELACO WDB has completed its last three ETP contracts with an “earned revenue” rate of 95-99%. ETP contracts are always performance-based, and therefore any earnings above the 90% level is “excellent” in the eyes of the State and reflects well for SELACO WDB in all future funding requests. Any performance above 100% means SELACO WDB will owe funds back to the State.


As a separate project from our WIOA grant programs the Executive Director has historically moved forward submitting on-going ETP applications, every two years, and accepting contracts for delivery services, periodically providing the Board an update on the status of the project. This memo services as an update as to the state of our ETP Project.

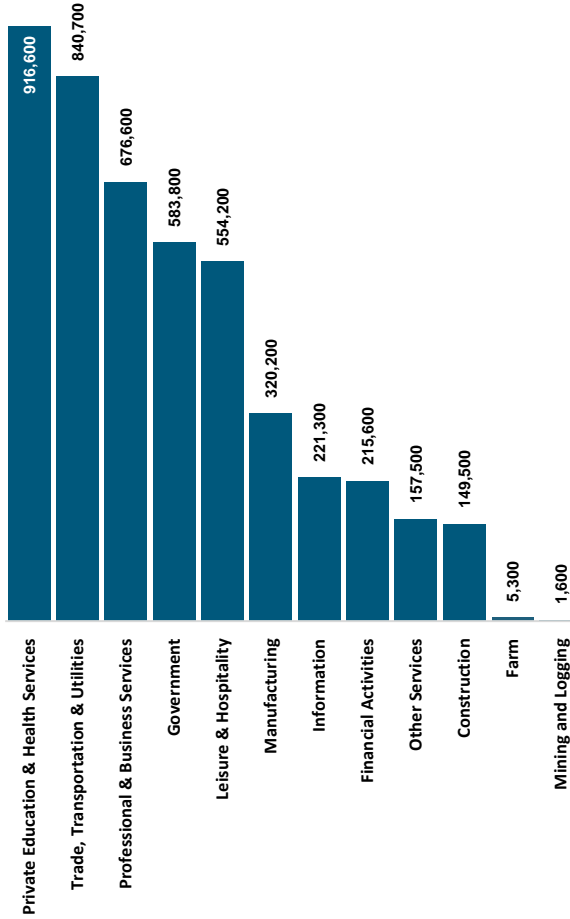

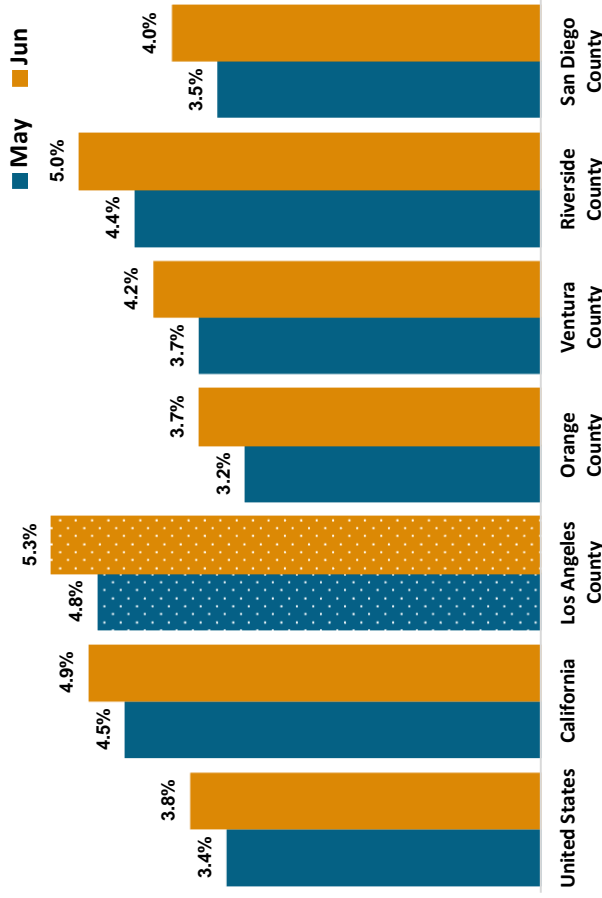

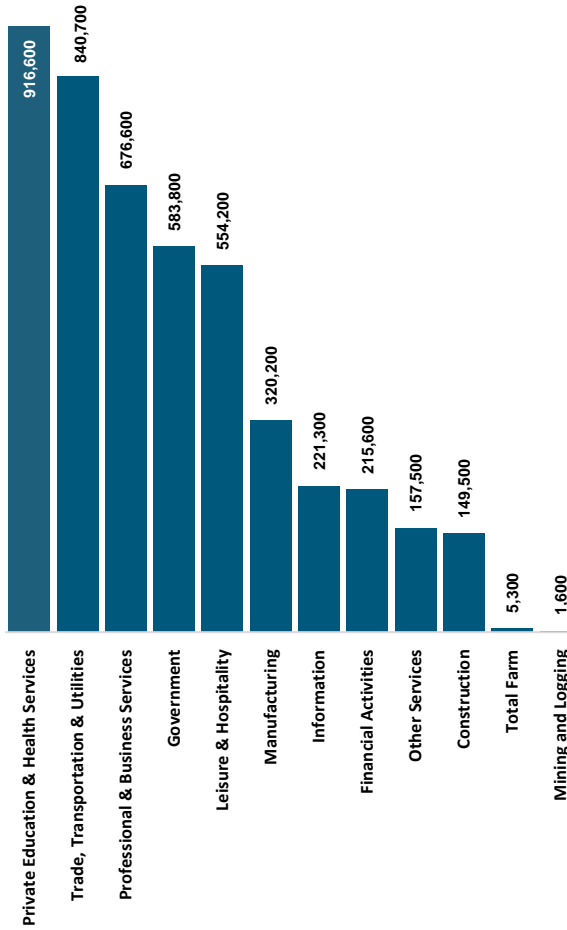

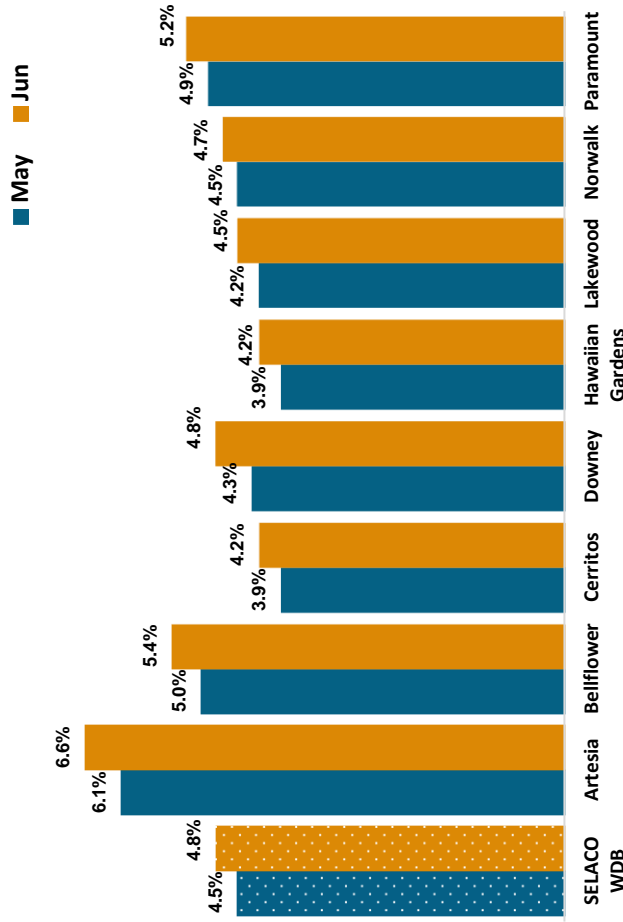

Nonfarm jobs gain 8,600 over the month and 99,700 over the year

The seasonally adjusted unemployment rate in Los Angeles County increased over the month to 5.0 percent in August 2023, from a revised 4.9 percent in July 2023, and was above the rate of 4.2 percent one year ago. Civilian employment was unchanged at 4,775,000 in August 2023, while unemployment increased by 4,000 to 250,000. The civilian labor force increased by 4,000 over the month to 5,025,000 in August 2023. (All of the above figures are seasonally adjusted.) The unadjusted unemployment rate for the county was 5.8 percent in August 2023.

The California seasonally adjusted unemployment rate was 4.6 percent in August 2023, 4.6 percent in July 2023, and 3.8 percent a year ago in August 2022. The comparable estimates for the nation were 3.8 percent in August 2023, 3.5 percent in July 2023, and 3.7 percent a year ago.

Between July 2023 and August 2023, total nonfarm employment in Los Angeles County increased by 8,600 to 4,626,000.

- Six industry sectors gained 15,700 jobs, while four sectors lost employment of 7,100 positions realizing a net month-over gain of 8,600 in nonfarm employment. The August nonfarm employment was 4,626,000, or 237,700 positions above the 10-year average of 4,388,300
- Government led all industry gainers, adding 4,400 jobs accounting for forty-eight percent of net gain in nonfarm employment. Local government added 5,700, while state government (down 1,000) and federal government (down 300) sustained losses.
- Private education and health services posted 4,100 job gains. Over 60 percent of the 3,600 jobs added in private education were from private colleges, universities, and professional schools (up 2,300). Health services made a modest gain of 500.
- Other sectors that gained jobs were: trade, transportation, and utilities (up 3,400), construction (up 2,400), professional and business services (up 1,100), and financial activities (up 300).
- The information sector had the greatest loss, dropping 5,000 jobs. Motion picture and sound recording industries subsector lost 5,100 jobs. The Writers Guild of America strike which began on May 2, 2023 continues to affect the employment levels in this industry.
- Other services experienced a loss of 1,300 jobs. Religious, grantmaking, civic, professional, and similar organizations (down 900) accounted for almost 70 percent of the deficit.
- Two other industry sectors experienced job declines: manufacturing (down 400) and leisure and hospitality (down 400). Mining and logging was unchanged.

Between August 2022 and August 2023, Los Angeles County nonfarm employment increased by 99,700, or 2.2 percent.

- Private education and health services was the year-over leader, adding 59,700 jobs or a 6.9 percent increase. Gains in health care and social assistance (up 45,200) were centered on social assistance (up 28,800), especially in services to individuals and families (up 25,900). Private educational services contributed the remaining balance of 14,500 jobs to the overall sectoral increase.
- Leisure and hospitality employment also had a 6.9 percent increase, adding 36,000 jobs over the year. The gains in accommodation and food services (up 26,000) were almost all in food services and drinking places (up 24,700). Arts, entertainment, and recreation increased employment by 10,000, chiefly in the performing arts, spectator sports, and related industries (up 8,200).
- Other industries that posted job gains over the year include professional and business services (up 11,700), trade, transportation, and utilities (up 11,600), other services (up 5,900), government (up 4,700), financial activities (up 2,100), and construction (up 300).
- Information (down 30,600) continued to endure the largest year-over loss. The Writers Guild of America strike has influenced the motion picture and sound recording industries employment, down 31,600. Motion picture and sound recording industries currently make up 59 percent of the information sector.
- The only other industry with a year-over loss was manufacturing (down 1,700). Mining and logging was unchanged.

RE: Board Member Espitia's Request for Changes in WIOA Allocation Throughout Our Region

At the July 27, 2023, Board meeting, member Espitia requested a breakdown comparison of 2023-24 WIOA funding for workforce boards in our region. As requested, Southeast Los Angeles County Workforce Development Board's (SELACO WDB's) Chief Financial Officer, Chau Diep prepared the attached chart illustrating the funding allocations for various local workforce development areas in California for fiscal year 2022-2023 and fiscal year 2023-2024, along with the changes in funding between the two fiscal years. Below are some highlights:

- SELACO WDB witnessed a significant 7% (\$306,313) increase in its overall funding, with the most substantial percentage boost occurring in our WIOA-Adult funding (+15%), followed closely by WIOA-Youth funding (+13%). However, SELACO WDB also experienced decreases in funding for our WIOA-Dislocated Workers (-5%), Rapid Response (-25%), and Lay-Off Aversion (-54%).
- In contrast, the LA Basin Region saw a more modest 3% increase in its overall funding during the same period. Conversely, Orange County faced a reduction of 6% in its funding, while the remaining local workforce development areas collectively experienced a 4% decrease.
- The LA Basin Region exhibited similar changes in funding percentages across various funding sources, with Orange County observing reductions in all funding categories. Meanwhile, the remaining local workforce development areas reported decreases in all funding categories except for Rapid Response.

- Notably, all local areas reported substantial reductions in funding for the Lay-Off Aversion Fund (39%) and WIOA Dislocated Workers (9%).
